Annual Review 2018

Foreword

2018 has been a hugely exciting and pivotal year for Sirona Therapeutic Horsemanship as we finally moved to our beautiful new home on the Dartington Hall Estate, near Totnes. This has been a long project, taking over 5 years to secure the lease, gain planning permission and then raise the funds to build the centre on a site with no existing services. However, we now have a new purpose-built centre comprising of a large free range open barn for our special herd of horses together with a separate stable block, a light and airy classroom, 2 separate arenas, 10 acres of grazing and a small woodland copse, all nestling into of a beautiful south facing valley surrounded by nature. Our participants are very happy to be at our new home, many commenting on what a peaceful, relaxed environment it is.

With a 20 year lease on a peppercorn rent, Sirona now has the security and facilities to develop our services into the future, and so provide a more stable and diverse income stream. Over the next 5 years we are planning to develop our small woodland copse to deliver Equine-Based Nature Activities led by our Forest School practitioner Angie. We will also expand our range of courses to those interested in learning more about equine-assisted interventions, with the first of these on 18th May 2019. We have had significant interest, both from referring organisations and the public wanting to know more about our activities at Dartington Hall, and so have our first official open day for the public on Saturday 15th June 2019. All are welcome so put this date in your diaries!

Despite all our energies being directed at fundraising and project managing the build of our new centre, we still found time to deliver our services and other activities during 2018, such as being invited to present at the Equine-Assisted and Facilitated Practitioners Conference at the Unicorn Centre in Gloucestershire in June, where Chair of Trustees Sarah Urwin and Sirona counsellor and practitioner Josie Arscott presented on the importance of supervision in our work.

Over the last 12 months, we've noticed an increase in referrals of young people with higher support needs, some requiring 2:1 support; amongst them are young people with significant mental health issues, including being hospitalised for self-harm. These sessions have a higher associated delivery cost, so, together with the budget cuts in social care we are having to rely more on grant funding and donations to provide bursaries for these young people. Our loyal team of volunteers have been tirelessly supporting Sirona in different ways to help with this; from helping serve tea and cakes at our open day, to poo-picking our fields and shaking collection buckets at fundraising events – we couldn't operate without this support.

Last but not least we want to thank all the trusts and donors who supported Sirona with the move to our new home – they are listed on the final pages in detail. A massive thank you to everybody who helped with making the move to our new dream home a reality.

Working Together

During 2018 Sirona worked with a diverse range of organisations to address need across Devon including Exeter, Plymouth Torbay, the South Hams, Teignbridge and Mid Devon

- Private sector providers: residential children's homes, adult learning disability providers.
- The voluntary and community sector: housing associations, YMCA, Action for Children and other charities.
- Direct referrals: i.e. parents of home-schooled children, adults with mental health issues and other support needs.

Impact & Evaluation

Our CEO Hannah Burgon was accepted onto the 2017/18 Social Entrepreneur Programme and supported by Mr Mark Cotton in developing and delivering our Annual Impact Report.

In summary, the report identified that across nine measures the majority of our participants;

- ☑ Reported improved confidence in trying new things or meeting new people
 ☑ Felt better able to understand and communicate feelings and emotions
 ☑ Were better at sticking to things they found difficult or challenging

Summary of a Case Study from our Impact Report:

14 year-old Claire was suffering extreme anxiety and not attending school. Her mental health issues had led to her being hospitalised several times. Claire initially attended 6 sessions with Sirona to help her deal with her feelings and emotions.

Claire then progressed to the Level 1
Horse Care course, demonstrating a
new-found enthusiasm and willingness
to learn. Her social worker commented
that Sirona transformed her from being
quiet and withdrawn, to being
animated and communicative.

After successfully completing the course Claire returned to school parttime. She said she felt more confident and better able to stay calm in difficult situations. Claire's mother said that the difference was "amazing, and a joy to see" - and that her more positive approach to life meant that they could really look forward to the future together.


Continuing Professional Development (CPD) is really important to Sirona and we aim to provide a really diverse range of training and events to our team to support our work with vulnerable groups, including safeguarding, child protection and first aid training as standard.

A highlight in 2018 was our patron, the well-known equine ethologist Lucy Rees coming over from Spain to deliver a training clinic for our team together with a fundraising evening lecture based on her new book on her research with wild horses.

These were really well received with both events selling out and raising over £3000 towards our new centre. A huge thank you to Lucy Rees for this.

Our Finances

Income:




Sirona's total income for 2018 was £213,124, of which £141,603 was grant income; session income totalled a little over £53,000, and £13,837 was received from donations (this total includes relevant giftaid, and also a single very generous anonymous donation of £7000 specifically for our new tack room). A further £4632 was generated from courses, events, and sales of T-shirts. Almost 70% of our income was restricted funding (£148,103), the bulk of which related to the building of our new centre at Dartington.

Moving from Seale Hayne to Dartington was always going to be a huge expense for a small charity such as Sirona, and the significant increase of 80% in grant funding (up from £78,655 in 2017) reflects both an enormous effort from within Sirona to identify and apply to grant-providers who might help us, and also the generosity of all the trusts and other organisations who have supported us in our endeavours. The net result is that it has been possible to complete the groundwork, stables, arena, and a round pen at our new centre within the year. As part of this project, Sirona was also granted a repayable 5 year loan of £30,000 from SWIG Finance Ltd., Seedbed Scheme.

During 2018, unrestricted reserves increased by £118,351 which directly relates to the increase in fixed assets as a result of the building of the new centre. Sirona now benefits from the security of a 20 year lease, and a centre which they now own.

Expenditure:

Our total outgoings in 2018 were £112,025. As ever, our most substantial expense was 'people costs', and at £64,023 this accounted for 57% of our expenditure, made up of salaries, wages, and associated costs of £37,694, session fees of £24,521, and volunteer expenses of £1808. Horses are a large expense too, and our spending on feed and tack for our equine herd totalled £9089. During the year we were pleased to be able to offer much needed bursaries to the value of £6544. We always strive to keep our office costs to the absolute minimum, reflected by expenditure of £4723 – just slightly over 4% of our total costs.


